Welcome back to an exciting new school year at King School! After approximately two weeks of unlimited sleep at the beginning of summer, I am usually looking forward to being back to work. I love my job!!! Why? I love being with your children; and, I love trying to assist our families to help their children to be the best people they can be, and to learn to their maximum capacity.

Research has shown that there is a direct relationship between good manners and positive behavior choices. Below are five areas we can review with our children:

- 1. **Greeting:** Saying "Good Morning," 'Good Afternoon," "Goodbye" or "Have a Nice Day" sets the tone for a positive relationship.
- 2. **Appreciating:** "Thank you" or "I appreciate that" or "I appreciate you" acknowledges that we are not taken for granted.
- 3. **Requesting:** Saying "Please," "May I," "Can you" when asking for help teaches us that we need each other; that none of us has all the answers.
- 4. **Sharing:** Sometimes we will have things that others need or can benefit from having. It can be as simple as a pencil, some water, or information as to where we can find something online. This helps our children develop empathy and compassion for each other.
- 5. **Apologizing:** I know it's hard for some of us to say "I am sorry" or "I did not mean to..." However, when we do, we are seeking to restore relationships and work together as a class, school, or family.

Parents, guardians, and staff, let us all try to remember to encourage our students to practice the above manners. It is my hope that together we will see an increase not only in learning; but also, in a general sense of caring for each other, and a general sense of personal well being here at King School.

Anti-Bullying Month

October is National Anti-Bullying Month. We focus on positive behavior throughout the school year at King School by reciting the King School Pledge daily, teaching character traits, utilizing Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports/PBIS strategies, focusing on our three school wide behavior expectations: Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Ready, empowering our students to create classroom expectations, teaching Social Emotional Learning lessons once a week, conducting class meetings twice a week, and Teaching **Stop-Walk-Talk**.

Please discuss **Stop-Walk-Talk** with your child and encourage him/her to use **Stop-Walk-Talk**. If someone is doing or saying something to a student that is not kind, the student should tell the student being unkind to **STOP** then **WALK** away from the unkind student. If the student continues to be unkind or the unkind behavior is extreme (causing physical pain), the student should **TALK** to an adult, and tell the adult what happened so that the adult can help the student. Talk to your child about letting staff members know when someone does or says something to him/her that is not kind; we do not want our students suffering in silence. The King School Staff will address negative behavior immediately when we are made aware of it.

Please feel free to contact your child's teacher, or Mrs. Webster, the building principal, if you have any questions or concerns about your child's safety or overall well being at King School. We are all a part of the King School Family that works together, and cares about each other.

King School's Anti-Bullying Pledge is: I make a COMMITMENT to take a stand against bullying. I will treat others with RESPECT and KINDNESS. I will have the COMPASSION to not be a bully and the COURAGE to not be a bystander. I will support Dr. King's dream by: LOVING, not hating, Showing UNDERSTANDING, not anger, Giving PRAISE, not put-downs.

Our character trait of the month is respect: the ability to honor, value, and demonstrate consideration and regard for others and oneself. Please discuss the importance of respect with your children at home.

Students' clothing/attire has an effect on the learning environment. At King School, we expect our students' dress and grooming to reflect pride in themselves and our school. Students should not wear clothing items that advertise, display, or promote drug, alcohol, violence, bigotry, disrespect to any group of people, etc. Students should not wear hats, winter scarves, bandanas, or anything else inside the school building on their heads except for religious beliefs. Bandanas should also not be worn anywhere on students' bodies at school.

All students must wear belts on pants, shorts and other bottoms that are lose fitting to avoid the exposure of under garments. Students should come to school dressed appropriately for the weather conditions each day. When the weather is cold, students should wear heavy coats, hats, and gloves/mittens scarves (outside).
